New signs to guide your Water Trail travels

This spring you may notice a few more things "blooming" along the lower Columbia River — Lower Columbia River Water Trail signs will be going up at sites from Beacon Rock, to the Port of Camas-Washougal, to the John Day Boat Ramp, to Netul Landing in Lewis and Clark National Historical Park. Each Water Trail sign is site specific and includes the site name, river mile, and amenity icons.





Water Trail

signs will go up primarily at launch and landing sites, but select camp, lodging, and food sites are also getting signs, such as Marks on the Channel in Scappoose (pictured left). Water Trail signs help paddlers identify sites, and also brand and spread awareness of the trail.
