

## **Hundreds Get on the Water for First Time**



The focus of the Summer Paddle Program is to provide opportunities for people to get out on the water who typically do not have access to paddling programs. Bridge Meadows is a non-profit housing community for elders and children in foster care and a partner of the Estuary Partnership. Additional summer partners include the Portland Audubon Society Explorador Camp, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Self Enhancement Inc., and Friends of the Children. A goal is to spark a desire in the participants to connect and care for our local waterways.

The Estuary Partnerships' Summer Paddle program began in 2008 with the goal of increasing connections to the lower Columbia River by facilitating positive and safe on-water experiences for youth, families and under served community organizations. Each year the program grows, reaching new audiences and connecting more people to the Columbia River. This summer, the Estuary Partnership organized and led 24 paddle trips, taking nearly 500 youth and adults on-water.

# Louisiana Swamp Project restores 35 acres of habitat

In August 2013 the Lower Columbia Estuary Partnership, Lower Columbia River Watershed Council, Columbia Soil and Water Conservation District and US Fish and Wildlife Service began moving earth to restore 35-acres of wetland habitat at the "Louisiana Swamp" site on the lower Columbia River, 4.5 miles west of Clatskanie, OR. The collaborative partnership with the landowner, Greenwood Resources, Inc. removed and lowered large portions of a levee to reconnect the floodplain to Westport Slough, a tributary to the Columbia River. Once restored, the site will be a tidal wetland with a network of backwater channels: ideal for wildlife and migrating salmon to feed, rest and escape extreme conditions of the slough and Columbia River.
